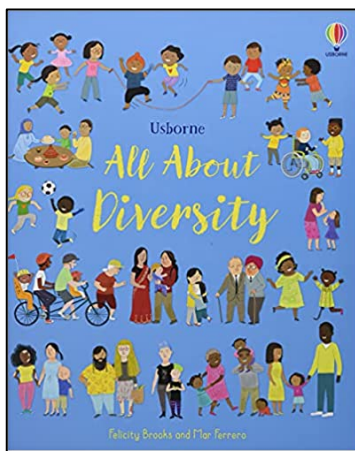


From Academy Award-winning actress Lupita Nyong'o comes a powerful, moving picture book about colourism, self-esteem and learning that true beauty comes from within.

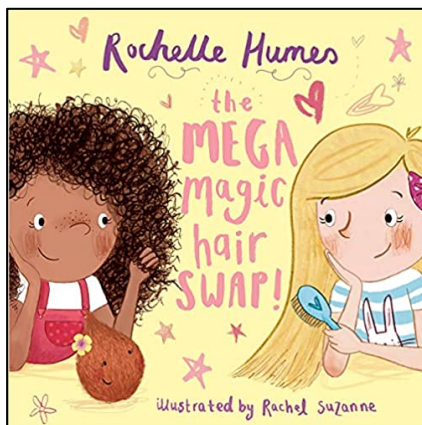
Sulwe's skin is the colour of midnight. She's darker than everyone in her family, and everyone at school.

Mai and Rose are best friends but they're not two peas in a pod.

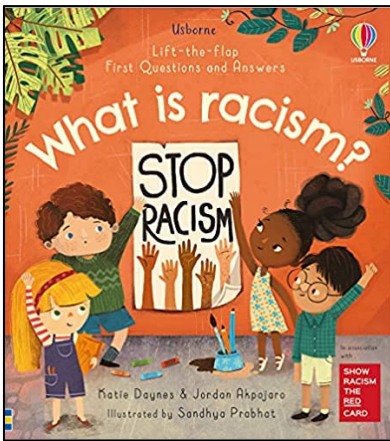
Mai has dark hair that is curly and whirly and never stays put. Why couldn't she have perfect hair just like her best friend Rose?

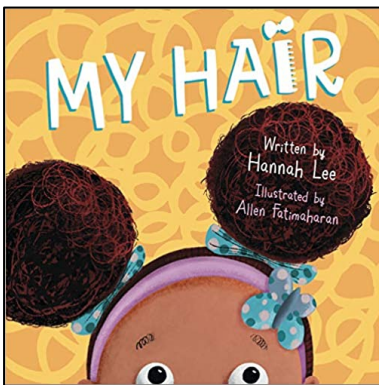

A joyful and fun story about celebrating differences and loving yourself from head to toe!

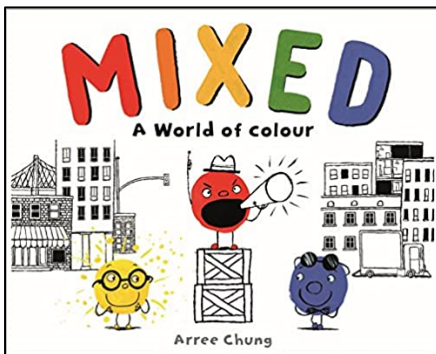
